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MHC Fan Integrity

I enjoy attending MHC athletic events watching our students play the game, parents and community cheering on the players/ and team, coaches coaching and officials making their best efforts to officiate a good game. Sometimes in the process of helping the team, spectator sportsmanship gets lost over a questionable call, coaching or official actions. This past week, I witnessed a fan in a tight basketball game become angry over an official's decision at the end of a game. He started yelling from the top row of the bleachers at the referees regarding their decision. The referees were incredibly professional, not responding to the upset fan and walked off the court. I am pleased to say this was NOT an MHC fan or parent.

I find it difficult at times myself, especially when I am wrapped up in a challenging game to remember that we have to role model positive fan sportsmanship. The Cambridge Dictionary defines "sportsmanship as the quality of showing fairness, respect and generosity toward the opposing team, players, for the sport itself when competing." Key terms are demonstrating respect, and generosity to others and the officials. So far this basketball season, we have done a good job of being a good spectator sportsmen.

As we move forward into district and sub-district play, I anticipate scores will be closer and our spectators will experience greater challenges in remaining good sports. Our team is looking to all of us in the area of good sportsmanship. We need to remember to "Give Our Referees a break!" When "bad" calls occur, and they will occur, it has been my observation that these get corrected with other calls later in the game. Fans supporting our student athletes to keep playing hard and preserving is very motivating, as they seek fan approval. The life lesson for our students is to persevere and problem solve through these experiences, as they will experience similar trials in life.

I have been pleased during the basketball season with our players and coaching staff dealing with poor behavior and unsportsman-like conduct exhibited by other team's players. I like seeing our team players help another team player up off the court when fouled. I commend players that refrain from saying degrading and disparaging comments when they are spoken to them. These are important life skill learning lessons to be respectful and demonstrate integrity to our team, opponents and the fans.

Sportsmanship begins with each team player and coach. As, I view the question of what is a "good sport," the golden rule comes to mind, "treat others the way you want to be treated," even if you do not get the same treatment in return. According to teamusa.org, essential sportsmanship elements are, "playing with integrity, respect of officials and coaches, self-control maintenance, and being a good sport and teammate." I believe as parents and school staff we desire for our students to display good sportsmanship at all times. As a parent, sometimes I had to remind my children what each of the element looks like. The best teacher that I have found with my daughters was my consistency in displaying the desired sportsmanship skills.

Integrity, which is doing what is right because it is right is a huge life skill and we learn this skill not only at home but through school activities. Treating coaches and referees with respect is fundamental to you as a player/ person being respected. We all know that players and referees will make mistakes during the game. Sometimes we fail to exercise proper self-control and students and community see our lack of sportsmanship. I have observed that when we as parents make disparaging comments to the referees that our team seems to pick up more fouls. So as spectators, we can positively help our team by supporting decisions and encouraging our teen athletes to demonstrate self-control and simply play well. During tough referee decision, I commend parents that shout, "move on and let's play."

Reflecting on sportsmanship, these skills are important life skills that our students need for greater success in life and career pursuits. Being positive and supportive, looking for the best in ourselves and others will help us to be better people and enjoy life pursuits. Let's demonstrate patience and rule referee acceptance by practicing good sportsmanship in all games and in the game of life. I am asking your help as we move forward into tournament play, to demonstrate great MHC game integrity and that our fans are the awesome leaders of sportsmanship that I know we possess.

Title 1 Tidbit February 2025

Make it Easier for Your Child to Focus

A world full of interesting distractions can make it tough for students to stay focused on schoolwork. Regularly zoning out in class can affect your child's ability to learn and retain information. Studies show that young students who can't focus tend to become older students who can't focus. To help strengthen your child's powers of concentration:

Remove distractions: TV's and other unnecessary devices should be turned off during study time.

Allow short breaks: A 5-minute breather can help kids clear their heads and refocus. Strive for movement during these breaks.

Turn big assignments into small tasks: If your child has to write a report, say "First, think about what you want to say. Next, make an outline. *Then* start writing." Help them by listening to them read it to you and then read it to them. This helps with the editing process.

Make a learning activity into a game to keep your child interested: After reading together, challenge your child to summarize the story using only three sentences. Another challenge might be to take turns making up a new story, sentence by sentence, using the same characters. Great follow up questions are to ask where the story took place, what was the main idea or theme, and who were the main characters.

Great Sleep: The best concentration comes with the right amount of sleep each night. For the best night's sleep, establish a consistent bedtime routine, keep the bedroom cool, dark, and quiet, and limit screen time before bedtime. Most importantly, turn off all devices/no screen time at bedtime.


